

FROM FATHER GARABED'S DESK......



Jesus said: "If you were of the world, the world would love his own; but because you are not of the world, but I have chosen you out of the world, therefore the world hates you." John 15:19

Marshall McCluhan, a well-known Canadian philosopher, educator, and communication theorist, once said, the *Media is the Message*.

But today, when a person who believes in God looks to finding information through the mainstream media on vital issues in life and faith, the sacredness of our beginnings, family issues, politics, gender issues, sexual preference, etc., there are flaws and errors in understanding God's truths.

Being uninformed about the world and its problems and issues is a sin against our vocation as leaders and Christian educators. Our beliefs concerning the issues I have just noted defines our battle lines and makes our mission as a Church and teachers of the faith quite challenging and at times more difficult.

With relatively few exceptions, the mass media tend to cover the aforementioned issues with a combination of ignorance, laziness, and world view bias in contrast to our traditional beliefs and moral values. Not only does our Christian faith receive this downplay, but it is the same for other faiths as well. Christians particularly make a very serious mistake by relying only on media outlets, TV, Internet, and especially printed media to guide us and provide for reliable news about religion.

The means of technology simply don't provide trustworthy information about religious faith. In fact, they are secular operations focused on one thing alone and that is....making a profit and becoming famous. In truth, they have very little sympathy for the Christian faith, and at that, promote quite a lot of aggressive skepticism toward any religious community that claims to preach and teach God's truth.

We may even assume members of the secular media themselves do not believe in God, and even less in Christian teaching. Thirty years ago, media analyst Robert Lichter surveyed the news media with stunning results. He found that of those surveyed, 50% did not believe in God, 86% seldom or never attended church or synagogue, and only 2% were practicing Christians. That was thirty years ago. The numbers are unquestionably worse today.

The heart of the story is that Christians and other people of faith deserve to have their stories told accurately by the mainstream media, without bias and without setting seeds of negativity. As parents and teachers of faith and a community of believers, we have a responsibility to hold the mainstream media and wider culture accountable when they fail to present a fair and balanced view of important issues and fail to question what is flawed.

The media, while playing down religious beliefs and offering them as options, and simultaneously raising their moral voice and taking an active role in civic life imposes a kind of unofficial state atheism. Forcing religious faith out of a nation's public square certainly does not serve democracy. Religious freedom means being able to worship as one chooses and includes the right of all religious believers, leaders, and communities to take part vigorously in a nation's public life for the purpose of edifying society in America.

Our task, therefore, is to prepare our children to be "capable defenders" of their faith and to live a life based on Christian values. Children growing up today in public arenas of education don't have the exposure to what we teach as Christians. How many scripted TV shows portray their characters heading to a weekly religious service, or portray Christians in a positive light? By cultivating our faith-based education early in our children's lives we can provide them a better success rate in staying away from crime and drugs when they are older.

Jesus said: "If you were of the world, the world would love his own; but because you are not of the world, but I have chosen you out of the world, therefore the world hates you." John 15:19

As your pastor and spiritual father, my intention in presenting this message to you is to raise these flags so we know exactly what we have to deal with. God has chosen the Church OUT OF THE WORLD, therefore the world (i.e. worldly, faithless people) hates or has no love for Christ and His Church. The words of Jesus couldn't be any clearer.

And so, our collective mission as a Church, a Church School, Christian educators and faith-community is to be teachers of the Christian Faith . . . helping our children:

- ◆ To become good moral human beings, making correct choices in life according to Orthodox Christian teaching
- ◆ To discover that their humanity is an image of God in themselves and to know God in Christ Jesus the Lord
- To develop a spiritual appetite a hunger and thirst for Him
- ◆ To satisfy that hunger, and worship Him daily and weekly at community prayer of the Divine Liturgy

 Let His hands touch you, His spirit breathe on you, His love embrace you, His Body and Blood feed you, His words quench
 your thirst, and you will find God, and experience your first step toward heaven, from this world to the world to come.

Several Komitas Choir members traveled to Windsor on Saturday, September 10th to participate in the Divine Liturgy offered for the Armenian community there by the Armenian Diocese of Canada. Services were held at St. John Anglican Church with Rev. Fr. Serop Azarian as celebrant. Requiem prayers were offered in memory of the victims of the September 11th terror attacks. A special cross processional took place on the occasion of the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross and with it the blessing of the basil. There were seventy-five people attending along with many children.

KEF KLUB WELCOMES SPEAKER TO MICHIGAN......

The original intent of St. John's Kef Klub each month was to bring members of the Armenian Community together for an evening of fellowship, recreation and good food, but it has become much more.

The Friday, September 16th Kef Klub gathering provided an additional feature by inviting Michael Guglielmo to speak. Mr. Guglielmo is currently the Executive Director of the Diocese of the Armenian Church of America, and served as Director of Social Services there from 1992 to 1997. During that period over 90% of his time was devoted to serving Armenian refugees and immigrants from the former Soviet Republics, making him well informed about the terrorism suffered by Armenians of Azerbaijan between the years of 1988-1991.

Throughout his presentation, Mr. Guglielmo cited actual acts of terror and ethnic cleansing, whereby pogroms targeted the Armenian population living in the historic Armenian regions of Baku and Sumgait. What made these events so heinous was the lack of concern and positive action by law enforcement officials. While looking the other way, those officials allowed military confrontations to escalate to the point where bloodshed was as common as the sun rising each morning.

The tragic events in Azerbaijan from 1988 to 1991 essentially occurred with little international reaction or offers to help those who were losing their personal property as well as their lives. Thousands of Armenians were forced to leave their homes entirely depleting the once well populated historic Armenian communities of Azerbaijan.

Therefore, once again a major human tragedy suffered by our fellow Armenians was ready to be entered into the textbooks of World History. The hope is that these pogroms as well as the Armenian Genocide which occurred during 1915 will someday be recognized by all people as tragic events against a peace-loving Christian nation. Despite all these historic events of tragedy, the Armenian people remain strong and committed to their Christian values.

During the meeting Edward Korkoian presented a new project that is underway in our community of a future memorial monument to honor the Armenian victims of the pogroms committed by the Azeris in Azerbaijan. This monument will be placed on the campus of St. John Armenian Church in Southfield, Michigan nearby the present memorial khachkar monument for the Armenian Martyrs of 1915. Mr. Korkoian indicated that the project needs approximately \$35,000 to complete. When the project is completely funded, then the formal dedication will take place during 2012.

As a special treat the supper was prepared by Chef Garri Mazmanian, owner of the Allegro Restaurant in West Bloomfield, Michigan. Mazmanian and his family fled Baku during the pogroms to find sanctum in the U. S. and a new life in the greater Detroit area. God has blessed him with the Allegro Restaurant and it was his honor to provide the meal for the Kef Klub. There are many other Baku Armenians like him who have risen from the ashes of this most recent tragedy, and we celebrate their achievements as we remember those who perished in Sumgait and Baku.

FREE HEALTH FAIR AT ST. JOHN'S SEPTEMBER 17^{TH}



For the second year, St John Armenian Church, the Wayne County Pharmacists Association (WCPA) and the Wayne State University (WSU) pharmacy students, with the support of Henry Ford Health Systems sponsored a free Health Fair at St John's Recreation Center Saturday, September 17th. The WCPA pharmacists and WSU students offered blood pressure, diabetes, and cholesterol screenings, medication review, smoking cessation as well as flu shots, all provided at no charge to the over one hundred participants. Included also were chiropractic screenings, podiatry, nutritional and dental experts who answered questions about nutrition and oral health. A social worker was available for assistance to those without insurance. Thanks go to Greg Baise and his crew for arranging this year's Health Fair.

Haiganoush Mengushian/ Gloria and Robert Ajemian Foundation St. John Armenian Church School Scholarship Established

Beginning with the 2011-12 academic year, the Church School of St. John Armenian Church of Greater Detroit will annually offer a scholarship to a college bound senior who successfully completes and graduates from the St. John's Church School Christian education program. The award will be announced on the day of graduation, May 20, 2011.

Robert Ajemian, a pious servant of the Lord and faithful parishioner of St. John Armenian Church, was passionate about Christian education during his lifetime, and saw the need to foster and support the education of our Armenian youth. Following his death we were informed that he had named the St. John Armenian Church School for a beguest to establish a scholarship. It is to be awarded annually to a graduating student from the Church School for college expenses. In accord with the wishes of his will, a seven-member scholarship selection committee comprised of St. John's parish members was organized by the Pastor, Fr. Garabed Kochakian, in order to construct the process of application and eligibility requirements for students. In many places throughout our nation, Sunday September 11th was a day when millions observed the 10th anniversary of an event that has already become a permanent historical tragedy.

Father Garabed, in his homily that Sunday morning, reminded a rather large congregation present that we as a community share our nation's grief over a tragedy which has affected the lives, both directly and indirectly, of many of our fellow Americans.

The 9/11 observances continued during the evening as a community-wide interfaith service of commemoration took place at Congregation Shaarey Zedek in Southfield. The theme for this gathering of diverse community leaders was to generate an active building of cultural unity, friendship and peace.

Numerous religious leaders from many faiths—Christian, Jewish, Muslim, Unitarian, Hindu—were present and had an opportunity to speak about the importance of this observance and the need for greater cultural tolerance. Several speakers noted that since the 9/11 event, tolerance and respect among Americans had lessened.

City of Southfield officials were present, led by Mayor Brenda Lawrence who offered words of welcome. Southfield's County Clerk, Nancy Malkasian Banks, offered a reading of Maya Angelou's poem, "Let There Be Peace."

Congressional representatives who were present included United States House of Representatives Sander Levin and Gary Peters. Their remarks reflected the need for continued efforts to bring about unity and tolerance for all people regardless of race, color or religion. They also remarked on the apparent trend of intolerance among the people of our nation. Much of this intolerance since 9/11 has surfaced through an increase of hate crimes perpetrated most often because of intolerant and misguided attitudes.

In addition to the invited religious participants, choir members from various religious groups, including our own Komitas Choir, joined the Congregation Shaarey Zedek choir to sing a program of patriotic songs. The youth of St. John Armenian Church were represented by Anoush and Armen Arslanian, who placed flowers on the *Bema* and led the "Pledge of Allegiance". A group from our parish joined other volunteers as ushers for the evening's worship service.

At the end of the commemoration, our pastor was invited to lead a "Prayer for our Country." The prayer was read in unison by all who were present. It referenced the accurate reasons why our nation was grieving in nearly every community and offered hope for all of us who live in this great nation. Fr. Garabed invited all present to offer the "kiss" and sign of peace to one another, as is done during worship in the Armenian Church.

Marriages

Arrangements for weddings are to be made at least eight months in advance. Marriage preparation and counseling are required before the celebration of the sacrament. The Bestman (Khachyeghpayr) must be a member of the Armenian Orthodox Church. The parish office will make all necessary arrangements for the deacon, organist and soloist. Marriages are not celebrated during Great Lent.

Baptisms and Chrismations

All baptisms must be scheduled at least two months in advance. Pre-baptismal preparation for the parents and godparents is required. At least one of the godparents must be a member of the Armenian Orthodox Faith.

Regulation of Sacramental Services

In accordance with Diocesan discipline mandated by the Primate, Archbishop Khajag Barsamian, all sacraments, e.g. funerals, weddings, baptisms and rites of Christian burial, can only be administered in the church sanctuary, which has been consecrated for the celebrations of these sacred rites.



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
