IN MEMORIAM: ARCHBISHOP TORKOM MANOOGIAN (1919-2012)



With deep sorrow, the Eastern Diocese of the Armenian Church of America mourns the passing of His Beatitude Archbishop Torkom Manoogian, the 96th Armenian Patriarch of Jerusalem, and the long-serving former Primate of our own Diocese.

Patriarch Torkom entered his eternal rest on October 12, 2012, at age 93. He was interred in Jerusalem, at the Patriarchal Cemetery, on Monday, October 22. In 2012, he suffered a serious decline in health. In January he was admitted to a hospital in Jerusalem, and subsequently was cared for in the city's Franciscan hospice, close by to the Armenian Patriarchate, where he was visited by friends and relatives. It was there that he fell asleep in the Lord.

Prior to his election as Patriarch of Jerusalem, Archbishop Torkom served for a quarter-century as Primate of the Eastern Diocese. To thousands of people across this country-not only in our parishes, but in the surrounding society-he was the vigorous, compassionate, always impressive face of the Armenian Church of America. He was also the beautiful, poetic voice of our people, advocating in a principled and forceful way for our concerns and aspirations, while embodying the great Armenian civilization that had bestowed works of profound art and spirituality on world culture.

His Beatitude was born in 1919 near Baghdad, Iraq, where his parents had sought refuge from the mass exterminations of Armenians in Ottoman Turkey known as the Armenian Genocide. As a boy he was enrolled in the Monastery of St.

James in Jerusalem, and was ordained a priest of the Armenian Church in 1939.

He arrived in the United States in 1946, to serve as pastor of the Holy Trinity Church in Philadelphia. Continuing his education at the graduate and post-graduate levels in America and Jerusalem, he was made a bishop in 1962, shortly after his election as Primate of the Western Diocese of the Armenian Church of America. In 1966, Bishop Manoogian was elected as Primate of the Eastern Diocese of the Armenian Church of America-the largest Armenian Church diocese outside of Armenia itself-and two years later was elevated to the rank of archbishop.

During his quarter-century as Primate, Archbishop Manoogian became a recognized and respected figure in ecumenical and civic settings, serving in an executive capacity for various ecumenical and interfaith organizations, and as an outspoken champion of human rights.


In April of 1990, after the passing of the previous patriarch, Archbishop Manoogian was elected as the 96th Armenian Patriarch of Jerusalem by the members of the St. James Brotherhood, and was officially enthroned on October 27, 1990. In his two decades serving the patriarchal throne, he took steps to revitalize the Patriarchate, and to preserve and extend its age-old role as a center for learning, pilgrimage, and scholarship for the Armenian Church.

When His Holiness Vasken I, Supreme Patriarch and Catholicos of All Armenians, passed away on August 18, 1994, the church's bishops and archbishops elected Archbishop Manoogian as the "Locum Tenens," or interim leader, who would serve as head of the Church until the election of a new Catholicos of All Armenians. Under the Patriarch's leadership, the proceedings for the history-making election of a new Catholicos were organized; with the selection of a successor, Patriarch Torkom returned to the Holy City, to continue his own historic effort in the Armenian holdings of Jerusalem.

As we mourn his passing, we are consoled in the knowledge that his gentle soul has found rest and peace in the welcoming arms of our Risen Lord, whom he loved and served with such dignity, integrity and distinction throughout his life. His Beatitude was interred at the Patriarchal Cemetery in Jerusalem, among the great Armenian churchmen of past ages.

There are examples of such people past and present. The Blessed Mother Theresa of Calcutta was an advocate of the poor and needy as she brought hope and love to all in India. Saint Gregory the Illuminator helped the emotionally disturbed and mentally ill king and cured him. The saintly head of our church in recent times, His Holiness Vasken I was a true hero of the faith as he challenged the evils of Communist atheism in Armenia.

We thank God for their example. They lived and died giving life to others and they are alive in heaven and are one with God. Such potential is in us all. Inside us all that seedling of sainthood is germinating.

Jesus says, by their fruit you will recognize them (Matt.7:20). All we need do is the work of God, living and showing that we are at one with Him.

"TLC" PAWS-ES TO LEARN

On Tuesday, October 9th, the Tuesday Lunch Club had the pleasure of a presentation from "Paws With A Cause®." Paws With A Cause is a national not-for-profit organization that was founded in Michigan in 1979. The agency is dedicated to serving people with disabilities by training and placing Assistance Dogs. Assistance Dogs include Service Dogs for people with physical disabilities, Hearing Dogs for people who are hard of hearing/deaf, Seizure Response Dogs for people with seizure disorders and Service Dogs for Children with Autism, for families living with autism. PAWS® has trained and certified close to 3,000 Assistance Dog teams.

Linda Tiffany introduced our Service Dog Sirius, a golden retriever, and his trainer and owner Liz Smith-Yeats. Using dogs to help people with disabilities began in the 1800's and increased after WWI when Leader Dogs for the Blind was started. Sirius was very obedient and he showed many of the things he has been trained to do, such as helping to remove a person's gloves, retrieve keys, pencils and other items his charge might need. The twenty-four in attendance were very impressed with Sirius. The TLC presented Liz Smith-Yeats with a donation to Paws®.

On October 23rd, Julie Jenkins made a presentation on "Exercise & Benefits of Exercise." Julie gave several examples of how important exercise is for an independent lifestyle. The several attendees were provided with several ideas to help increase their use of exercise in their lives.

LEARNING ABOUT THE OSKANIAN BIBLE

We declare to you what was from the beginning, what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes, what we have looked at and touched with our hands, concerning the world of life...(1 John 1:1)

These words have travelled not just from one place to another, but also from generation to generation. From the time of St. John writing them in the 1st century, the words from sacred scripture have been recited, chanted, listened to—in every language under the sun including Armenian. But it wasn't until the 15th century that they could actually be read - not merely by the few who had access to handwritten manuscripts like the monks and donors of such books, but by common people who had the blessing of literacy.

Johannes Gutenberg, a knight of Mainz, Germany, invented the movable type printing process in 1440 and published his 42-line Bible 15 years later. Gutenberg's invention and publication sparked one of the world's great communications revolutions that to this day has been the primary means for communicating the eternal words of the Holy Bible.

In the 16th century, it also inspired some leaders of the Armenian Church. With printed volumes spreading throughout Western Europe, a humble but ambitious servant of our people named Hakob Meghapart took it upon himself to establish an Armenian printing press. He set up shop in Venice, Italy. This became the world's first Armenian printing house, publishing the first six printed Armenian books between 1509 and 1513. In 1585, the Armenian Catholicos Azaria of New Julfa (1584-1601) recognized Meghapart's efforts and by letter, requested help from Pope Gregory XIII in Rome, with a proposal to support the efforts of Meghapart with the printing of a complete Armenian Bible in Venice.

That request was never answered; but the idea lived on and captured the imagination of the Armenian community,

whose members with a thirst to read firsthand the holy words of God galvanized themselves and provided the necessary funding by contributing to the project. In a sense they became translators by lending their financial support and making it possible for Armenian clerics to progressively set up printing houses in many cities. At last, under the pontificate of Catholicos Philippos I Aghbaketsi (1633-55), the first printed Armenian Bible was published.

Oskan Erevantsi (1614-74) had started a printing press in Amsterdam with the help of affluent Armenian patrons. In 1666 he printed the first complete Armenian Bible, which in his honor is known as the Oskanian Bible.

The Oskan volume consisted of 1,462 double pages, with 159 engraved illustrations by the Dutch artist Christoffel van Sichem. They are considered masterpieces of the arts of printing and bookbinding, and a valuable artifact of the Armenian Christian heritage. There are four specimens owned by our Manoogian Museum and one that is continually on display. The Krikor and Clara Zorhab Information Center of the Eastern Diocese is home to one of the early copies of the Oskanian Bible as well.

These relics of history printed in the classical Armenian *k'rapar* continue to sing out to the reader and inspires a kind of spiritual connection with those who have handled them in the past, and with the artisans who created them three and a-half centuries ago.

Today we can still encounter them on the printed page and in the music of its immortal verses. Best of all, we can experience the Bible in church in the company of our fellow believers in our eternal, welcoming home.

"I have much to write to you, but I would rather not write with pen and ink; instead I hope to see you soon, and we will talk together face to face." (3 John 1:13-4)

Marriages

Arrangements for weddings are to be made at least eight months in advance. Marriage preparation and counseling are required before the celebration of the sacrament. The Bestman (Khachyeghpayr) must be a member of the Armenian Orthodox Church. The parish office will make all necessary arrangements for the deacon, organist and soloist. Marriages are not celebrated during Great Lent.

Baptisms and Chrismations

All baptisms must be scheduled at least two months in advance. Pre-baptismal preparation for the parents and godparents is required. At least one of the godparents must be a member of the Armenian Orthodox Faith.

Regulation of Sacramental Services

In accordance with Diocesan discipline mandated by the Primate, Archbishop Khajag Barsamian, all sacraments, e.g. funerals, weddings, baptisms and rites of Christian burial, can only be administered in the church sanctuary, which has been consecrated for the celebrations of these sacred rites.

FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

Due to the tightness of our budget, it is imperative that we reach our targeted income for Pledges and Stewardship. We have sent out notices to those who still have remaining balances. If it is within your means, please make your payments as soon as possible. For those who have already covered their commitments, if

there is any extra you can offer, any amount would be greatly appreciated.

Last year we were blessed with unexpected gifts and unanticipated revenues from the celebration of our Eightieth Anniversary. We were able to put monies aside. If necessary, we can tap a portion of those reserves. It is not our first choice. This Council is committed to reining in our expenses while enhancing our revenue stream.

To that end, we have formed an Endowment and Gift Committee. As we move forward, we will present opportunities for the creative building of our Endowment Funds. We all need to remain open and flexible to all avenues so that we can ensure the viability of our Church for future generations in the greater Detroit area.

We pray that the Holy Spirit continues to guide our Community and its Council. With God's blessings upon our works let us carry forward the Torch our Forerunners passed to us.

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
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
